

# Daily Phonics Learning At Home

## Practising Graphemes and Tricky Words

Encourage your child to practise saying all of the Phase 2 and 3 phonemes in their phonics book and to read all the tricky words with you each day. You can make this more exciting by writing them out and hiding them in the house or garden for your child to go on a 'tricky word' or 'grapheme' hunt. You could make a matching pairs game or a version of bingo. (If you feel your child is reading and writing words with Phase 2 & 3 graphemes very confidently, try looking at Phase 4 [The website [www.letters-and-sounds.com](http://www.letters-and-sounds.com) has guidance about all of these phases.]

## Segmenting to spell and blending to read words.

There are lots of games you can make at home to help your children learn to read and spell words containing Phase 2, 3 and 4 graphemes. ## Reading and writing sentences

Ask your child to write a simple sentence containing words with Phase 2 & 3 graphemes and tricky words e.g

'The red bus is big.'



'My cat sat on the rug.'



In addition to this daily phonics practice, one of the daily activities that will be emailed to you will sometimes be a specific phonics task.
